Lung transplantation marks a fundamental advance in the treatment of different forms of parenchymal and vascular lung diseases. However it has also become a source of serious decisional, organizational and technical questions. We have seen, in the past years, a constant increase in the number of parenchymal pathologies and forms of pulmonary hypertension that could benefit from the use of this type of therapy, calling attention to the gap between the small number of donors and the many potential recipients. Also, a lung transplant often exposes the recipient to a variety of complications among which acute and then chronic rejection are the most dangerous. The second edition of "Recent insights and new perspectives in lung transplantation" will compare personal experiences with those of a number of the most highly qualified international Centers. In particular, with regard to acute and chronic rejection we will consider strategies developed to prevent, treat and avoid these eventualities, such as the role of exhaled NO and the opportunities offered by the most recent immunosuppressive drugs and by extra-corporeal photophoresis. We will also review in our contry the cost of the procedure, organ-sharing protocols and the quality of life after transplant. In the hope of extending lung transplants to more and more patients, donor pool studies are being made with a view to using marginal donors and the possible risks connected with this approach. For a long time pulmonary circulation has been neglected, both in its primary and secondary hypertensive forms. Now heart and lung specialists are frequently forced to work together in the treatment of these patients. Fortunately, in primary pulmonary hypertension, medical therapy can be beneficial in some cases; when medical therapy fails, however, the type of transplant to perform has to be considered. In the secondary pulmonary hypertension group, for patients exhibiting the Eisenmenger syndrome, the main consideration is, again, the type of transplant to perform, depending on the congenital defect. For chronic thromboembolic patients, the conference will illustrate the indications, techniques and results of pulmonary thromboendarterectomy in comparison with lung transplantation that now is limited only to few patients. At this second conference in Pavia, some of the most highly qualified Italian and foreign scientific experts will explore the current situation and relative problems, outlining the protocols and proposing therapeutic innovations of extreme interest.
